



CONSULTATION PROCESS







STEP 1: CROWN SENDS LETTER


Grown notifies the Mi'kmaq and requests consultation on a project happening in Nova Scotia


STEP 2: ASSEMBLY PROVIDES DIRECTION

Will a community proceed on their own or will they direct KMK to quide the work?

COMMUNITIES CAN CHOOSE TO TAKE THE LEAD OR DIRECT KMK TO WORK ON THEIR BEHALF UNDER THE TERMS OF REFERENCE FOR A MI'KMAQ-NS-GANADA CONSULTATION PROCESS (TOR)








STEP 3: IF THE ASSEMBLY DIRECTS KMK TO GUIDE THE WORK


KMK works with the Assembly's portfolio lead, begins research and community engagment to identify impacts to Rights and Title

STEP 4: WORKING WITH MI'KMAQ

KMK works alongside other Mi'kmaw communities, organizations (MCG and UINR) and experts

CONSULTATION WITH THE MI'KMAQ MUST HAPPEN WHEN PROJECTS COULD HAVE ANY IMPACTS TO OUR MI'KMAW RIGHTS AND TITLE







STEP 5: PROTECT MI'KMAW RIGHTS, WORK AND RESPOND

KMK coordinates consultation with the Grown about Mi'kmaw concerns and potential impacts to archaeology, environment, natural resources, animal and aquatic species, etc.

STEP 6: ONGOING OBSERVATION OF PROJECTS

Continuous monitoring and management from planning to reclamation with the goal of protecting and implmenting Mi'kmaw Rights and Title

WHEN THE MI'KMAQ ARE ENGAGED IN MEANINGFUL CONSULTATION AND OUR CONCERNS ARE ADDRESSED, IT CAN LEAD TO POSITIVE RESULTS FOR THE MI'KMAQ
